European Languages

Germanic Language Family

- Has the most native speakers
- Most live in northwest and central Europe
- English & German are part of this family
 - About 20% of Europeans speak one of these two languages
- Most Europeans learn English as a

Romance Language Family

- Includes French, Italian, & Spanish
- Most live in the south and west of Europe
- These languages come from Latin, the language of the ancient Roman Empire

Slavic Languages

- Includes Russian
- Found in central and eastern Europe
- Written with a Cyrillic alphabet
